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FROM THE DIRECTOR OF GOLF JOHN MALINOWSKI



There have been many rumors and questions regarding the clubhouse and what is or isn't happening, so I thought I would set the record straight and give you an update.

There are three major issues currently being tackled. The first is keeping water from leaking in the building. You will see the

Public Works crew installing new drainage around the clubhouse and sealing up other areas that seem to invite water into the building.

As this is completed, the second issue—mold—will be addressed. Mold remediation is taking place in the ladies' locker room, the Golf Shop and the room that used to serve as my office. ServPro has been hired to do the remediation, and you'll see technicians on the premises doing clean up this week.

The third, and perhaps the most crucial, task is to determine what is going to happen to the building in terms of renovation or replacement. There are many

opinions about what should be done and the OPA Board of Directors is looking at these options. I have been invited to be a part of the discussions and will let everyone know what is happening as the process moves forward.

In the meantime, we are continuing to spruce up what we can. Trees are being planted to shield the cart barn and maintenance shed, and I'm pleased that many of you have been enjoying the newly updated patio and porch areas. Fall—barring any wet weather—is a wonderful time to enjoy the Pines, so I hope you'll take advantage, both on the course and off!

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT RUSTY MCLENDON

Well before Ocean Pines was developed, this area was more than likely a tidal marshland. The soils stayed saturated by the rise of the tidal waters and rain accumulation of the back bays. Soils were heavy with silt and sediment with the only outlet all the way down in Chincoteague. Then came the storm of 1933 creating the inlet at Ocean City.

Opening up the inlet gave the back bays an outlet to drain more freely. This also opened up opportunities for coastal-style living along these back waterways. As the Pines was developed and the golf course came around, the soil maintained the same physical characteristics; once it becomes saturated it takes some time to dry out. In the summer,

occasional rainstorms will be absorbed and used by the plant with minimal runoff. Accordingly, cart traffic can return to the fairways much more quickly. Once the soils become saturated from more frequent rainfall in the spring and fall, it can take much longer for them to dry enough to allow carts to return to the fairway.

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HANDICAP & RULES COMMITTEE NEWS

The Flagstick: What am I supposed to do?

When it comes to the flagstick, there are written rules you must follow and the unwritten ones you should honor.

USGA Rules: Striking a removed flagstick or the attended flagstick (including the person tending it) when making a stroke anywhere on the putting green is a penalty (loss of hole in match play; two shots in stroke play and the ball is played as it lies). Remember this important key when you

play: If you authorize someone to tend the pin, the responsibility for what happens next is on you. In short, if your attendant doesn't pull the flag out in time, or someone in your group or match places it in a spot where your ball still hits it, *you* get the penalty.

Before making a stroke from anywhere on the course, the player may have the flagstick attended, removed or held up to indicate the position of the hole.

If the flagstick is in the hole and anyone stands near it while a stroke is being made,

he is deemed to be attending the flag. If, prior to the stroke, the flagstick is attended, removed or held up by anyone with the player's knowledge and he makes no objection, the player is deemed to have authorized it.

If an opponent in match play or a fellow-competitor in stroke play, without the player's authority or prior knowledge, attends, removes or holds up the flagstick during the stroke or while the ball is in motion, and the act might influence the movement of the ball, the oppo-

nent or fellow-competitor incurs the applicable penalty.

If you're lucky enough to have a shot from off the green get wedged between the flagstick and the hole and not fall below the lip of the cup, be careful how you proceed. If you move the flagstick, or authorize someone else to do it, and the ball comes to rest at the bottom, it's holed. But if it doesn't drop, you must place it on the lip of the hole (no penalty-yeah!) and tap in.

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Unwritten: Some tips on etiquette

When tending the flag stick, hold it at arm's length. Your body and shadow should be away from the hole and your feet should be away from where the ball is going to roll. Loosen the flagstick a bit before someone putts to make sure it's not jammed into the hole liner. Once the ball is rolling pull the flag

straight up and make sure you move away from the action. When you remove the flagstick, place it gently on the ground. Letting it drop may cause damage to the green. The first person in the hole picks up the flag and replaces it, carefully, back in the cup, after everyone has holed out. Make sure the area around the cup is not damaged or any spike marks are left around the hole.

Quiz: If a stroke from on the green strikes the flagstick that was placed off the green, does the player still incur a penalty? Yes!

Be sure to visit the USGA website to watch the excellent videos on rules and etiquette.

Also, please remember posting of scores ends in Maryland on November 15, but if you are traveling anywhere from Virginia south or

out west you are still required to post your scores when you are in an area that still observes an active season. Just go to the MSGA website or Golfnet to post your scores. Your scores can also be automatically transferred from one club to another using each club's identification number and your member number. Ask your pro about setting this function up for you.
